Years of data indicate many school shootings are preventable but missed opportunities, critical lapses in communication, and the lack of defined procedures result in dire consequences. Developing a comprehensive protocol that establishes consistent communication amongst school safety partners can effectively interrupt violence.

1:00 – 2:00 PM Hate Crimes: Prevention, Reporting, and Response

This session will include information on defining, identifying, reporting, prosecuting, and preventing hate crimes. It will also focus on community responses to hate crimes using real-world examples and suggested best practices for law enforcement and government agencies for community engagement to help in hate crime prevention. The presentation will include real-world strategies to combat hate crimes from other agencies that work in hate crime prevention. The session will also focus on prevention and community engagement. It will include updated statistics based on the most recent DOJ reporting.

2:15 – 3:15 PM Mapping Crime: Data-Driven Solutions for Safer Communities

This presentation will explore the Colorado Data Dashboard Project and its implementation in the 17th Judicial District Attorney's Office. The process of data-driven prosecutorial decision-making will be explored. The District Attorney's Office collaborated with law enforcement and the health department to co-create gun violence heat maps. Crime prevention strategies which have been successfully implemented to target gun violence trends will be examined.

3:30 – 4:30 PM The Landlord Engagement Project

The Network is an intelligence-driven counter-trafficking organization. The team consists of professionals with backgrounds in the intelligence community, data analytics, and victim service provision. Their sole focus is the Illicit Massage Industry (IMI) — arguably one of the largest known forms of sex trafficking in the United States. They provide partners with data, intelligence, and strategy to disrupt trafficking in Illicit Massage Businesses (IMBs). The Landlord Engagement Program (LEP) is an efficient and cost-effective strategy to engage landlords and decrease the number of IMB storefronts in a region. By engaging landlords, the LEP is an effective tactic in closing IMB storefronts without exhausting valuable and limited agency resources.

9:00 - 10:00 AM Prosecuting Outside the Box: Community-Based Inspiration and Innovation

> Like many prosecuting agencies, the Atlantic County Prosecutor's Office (NJ) has experienced an increase in cases and backlog due to COVID-era policies, increases in lower-level, quality-of-life offenses. spikes in juvenile crime, the impact of bail reform, new laws and directives as to drug prosecutions, and much more. The tools available through statute and court rule—Recovery/Drug Court, probation supervision, and supervised release—have not sufficiently met this wave. This presentation will introduce the problems encountered through direct community engagement and describe in detail the programs that were created, the role of courts, defense, and outside agencies, data and discernable impact thus far. An emphasis will be placed on a violence-interruption diversion program that provides trauma-informed therapy to juveniles and young adults, with input from the providing agency on that program and their experience helping develop prosecutor-led diversion programs across the nation.

Prosecutors, Police, and Community: A Unified Front in Reducing Gun Violence (Panel Discussion)

Join us for an insightful panel discussion on the Kansas City Police Department's innovative crime reduction program, SAVE KC (Stand Against Violence Everyone, Everywhere, Every Day). This initiative encompasses the collaborative efforts of police, prosecutors, and community service providers, and aims to reduce homicides and gun violence through focused deterrence, tailored services, and resources to mitigate criminal activities. The program emphasizes community involvement, bringing together law enforcement, the district attorney's office, community groups, and social service providers, to offer comprehensive support such as job training, housing assistance, and counseling. Additionally, the panel discussion will cover SAVE KC's restorative approach, helping individuals change their lives while holding them accountable and creating a safer community. Attendees will also learn about Elevate Blue, a virtual training suite of courses developed under a cooperative agreement with the Department of Justic Bureau of Justice Assistance, and in partnership with key stakeholders such as the National District Attorney's Association, providing virtual training to law enforcement, enhancing public safety through evidence-based practices and diverse perspectives.
