



Amicus Curiae Policy of The National District Attorneys Association

The National District Attorneys Association (NDAA) accepts requests to file or invitations to join *amicus curiae* briefs in cases that address the interests of the nation's prosecutors. Any request submitted will be shared with NDAA's Amicus Working Group for review and determination of its applicability to NDAA's work.

To request consideration of a brief, any interested party should contact NDAA's Executive Director, Nelson Bunn, at nbunn@ndaajustice.org. The request should include the name of the case, current status of the case, any background material on the case, the deadline for a brief and a short explanation as to how the case impacts the prosecution profession.

Note: General NDAA policy is to only consider requests for briefs in cases where a petition for writ of certiorari (cert petition) has been granted by the United States Supreme Court. Very limited exceptions apply to this policy.

NDAA will inform the requesting party of the Association's decision promptly.
